## May 2, 2023 Oliver township board meeting minutes.

Supervisor, Tom Ziel opened the meeting at the Township hall at approximately 7 PM. Members and guest present; Tom Ziel, Adam Herford, Steve Vaughan, Jamie Wolschlager, Kevin McKenzie, Gary Sweeney, and Bob Ross.

Motion by Bob Ross to approve agenda with a change in wording regarding appointment of Planning Commission and ZBA members. Agenda was written with ZBA only. Support by Adam Herford. Motion passed.

Consent agenda adoption, minutes of the previous board meeting and a list of bills paid. Motion to approve by Kevin McKenzie and seconded by Gary Sweeney. Motion passed.

Treasurer's report:

Balance on hand is \$1,014,594.65

Adam Herford spoke with financial advisors at Raymond James at Bad Axe and told the group they pay 5% on deposits. He will follow up with more information next month.

Fire Chief's report:

Fire Chief, JimSeley, reported the department got paid for a fire run from last fall.

The annual fundraiser breakfast/raffle is coming up. The department is looking for 10 sponsors at \$400 each. They have several lined up already. The breakfast will be held at the Youth Center, May 21st, 8 AM to 12:30 PM.

The department did training at Laker high school last month. They also practiced putting on their air packs inside the firetruck.

Pumper truck number 2 had a water leak in the tank. Richmond Steel repaired the tank by welding on a patch.

There was one fire run on April 24th. The department assisted Windsor Township on a house fire in Pigeon.

Dan Armbruster and Jim Seley are working on the grant process.

Supervisor Tom Ziel reported the asphalt bids for Richardson Rd is \$210,000 and Maxwell Road is \$218,000.

Every year the Township Board has to appoint two Planning Commission members and one Zoning Board of Appeals member for 3-year terms. Dan Drabek (PC), Scott Holzwart (PC) and Gary Sweeney

(ZBA) are due for reappointment. Motion by Adam Herford to re-appoint Drabek, Holzwart and Sweeney to their positions. Support by Bob Ross. Motion passed.

The Oliver Township Clerk, (currently Bob Ross) is a permanent member of the Planning Commission.

Zoning Board of Appeals: Terry Renn as chairman (until 2024). Bill Herford (until 2025). Gary Sweeney (until 2026).

Tom Ziel reported a complaint about garbage in a township residence yard. Bob Ross will provide a copy of ordinance. Owner of property will be notified soon.

Tom Ziel also reported that he would work with Sarah Mallory to submit paperwork for Covid relief report.

County commissioner, Steve Vaughan, reported there is a statewide effort to protest the annexation of 55,000 acres of public and private land next to the Grayling military base. He offered a resolution for the township to vote on. It says that our township would be against the annexation. Motion by Bob Ross to accept and agree with resolution. Support by Kevin McKenzie. Roll call Vote; Ziel-yes, Herford-yes, McKenzie-yes, Sweeney-yes, Ross-yes. Resolution passed. See attached copy of resolution.

Bob Ross reported the Planning Commission met and they recommend Oliver Township place a moratorium on commercial solar development until they finish the commercial solar ordinance. Motion by Adam Herford to proceed with a moratorium on Commercial Solar development until the Planning Commission finishes their ordinance. Support by Gary Sweeney. Motion passed. Tom Ziel will notify the township lawyer, to proceed with public notices, etc. etc.

Bob Ross reported that Marilyn Herford would like her mile of Farver road paved. It may take a few years but efforts will be made toward that goal. It's condition is poor and will need work to get ready for paving.

Motion to pay bills by Adam Herford and supported by Kevin McKenzie. Motion passed. See attached list.

RESOLUTION TO OPPOSE THE CAMP GRAYLING USE OF STATE LANDS BY PERMIT RESOLUTION NO: 2023 — 17

WHEREAS, The DNR and the Michigan National Guard have entered into a contract, entitled "Memorandum of Understanding" (MOU), as a framework for the issuance of a series of permits over the next five years and beyond, for the use of state lands up to 52,000 acres for military training exercises, and controlled trials of cyber and electronic warfare training technologies with up to 600 soldiers and "affiliated partner members".

WHEREAS, Northern Michigan, and specifically our township, relies on the recreational opportunities presented by their beautiful rich forests, pristine rivers, and open farmlands and the people of Northern Michigan want to retain what is left of its rustic and natural outdoor playground atmosphere, for the enjoyment of its citizens and visitors.

WHEREAS, the Guard is still dangerously vague about the planned activities they will be conducted and the potential for adverse efforts and the lands, wetlands and wildlife; and that there is no provision in the MOU for an environmental impact statement or even an environmental assessment, that should be done on the entire acreage before any permit is applied for or issued.

WHEREAS, the Michigan National Guard has yet to demonstrate that they cannot conduct these military uses on their existing 230 square miles.

WHEREAS, the "access" by the public to these lands as described in the MOU is a fallacy, because operations and maneuvers by as many as 600 soldiers and partners will interfere access by others.

WHEREAS, the permit process as outlined in the MOU and as provided by law does not provide the opportunity for the public

to be heard and have input.

WHEREAS, the supposed restrictions on uses by the Guard are a fallacy, because there is no mechanism for the DNR to track violations of these restrictions, no mechanism for people to report violations, no mechanism or obligation of the Guard to remedy violations, and there are no repercussions, including the termination of the MOU, when the Guard violates any of the restrictions meant to protect these lands and allow continued public use.

WHEREAS, these proposed uses on these lands will disrupt the peaceful enjoyment of the natural resources and reduce the effectiveness of the "PURE MICHIGAN Campaign," reduce tourism dollars to community businesses, and create even more hardships for its citizens.

WHEREAS, the Michigan National Guards usages of our public land has already created contamination of the areas ground water and has already been poisoning citizens for years without giving the community a plan for cleanup.

WHEREAS, the MOU increases use within the Manistee, Muskegon and AuSable River watersheds, thus increasing the possibility of contamination in the Great Lakes; since the Manistee and Muskegon Rivers both flow into Lake Michigan. The AuSable River flows into Lake Huron.

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of Camp Grayling uses of state lands is directly contrary to the Mission Statement of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources: "We are committed to the conservation, protection, management, use and enjoyment of the state's natural and cultural resources for current and future generations." and it is contrary to the DNR's obligations by state law: "The department shall protect and conserve the natural resources of this state; provide and develop facilities for outdoor recreation; prevent the destruction of timber and other forest growth by fire or otherwise; promote the reforesting of forestlands belonging to this state; prevent and guard against the pollution of lakes and streams within this state and enforce all laws provided for that purpose with all authority granted by law; and foster and encourage the protection and propagation of game and fish."

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the

OLIVER

Township Board opposes the

MOU and the allowing these military uses of state lands by
permits to be issued to the Guard.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge the Governor and the DNR Director to immediately terminate the Memorandum of Understanding, as provided for in that contract.

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
